This card was issued to a participant in a hypodermic syringe exchange program authorized by the New York State Department of Health under Sections 80.131(a)(2) and 80.135 of Title 10 New York Code of Rules and Regulations and Section 3381 of the Public Health Law. The participant can lawfully possess hypodermic needles and syringes furnished by the syringe exchange program or collected by the participant for exchange or disposal with the program in all parts of New York State.

Rear view – All Participant ID cards contain a statement of authority, detailing the relevant sections of New York State law and regulations authorizing the Syringe Exchange Program (SEP). Note – participants in a SEP in a particular jurisdiction can lawfully possess hypodermic instruments anywhere in New York State.

SYRINGE LAW

Changes in the New York State Penal Law provide that a person does not act unlawfully by possessing a hypodermic needle or syringe if he or she participates in certain syringe programs authorized under the New York State Public Health Law. Effective October 28, 2010, the possession of a residual amount of a controlled substance on a needle or syringe does not constitute a criminal act if the individual is permitted to possess such needle or syringe under the Public Health Law. Here are the amended sections, effective October 28, 2010:

§ 220.45 Criminally possessing a hypodermic instrument.

Effective October 28, 2010

A person is guilty of criminally possessing a hypodermic instrument when he or she knowingly and unlawfully possesses or sells a hypodermic syringe or hypodermic needle. It shall not be a violation of this section when a person obtains and possesses a hypodermic syringe or hypodermic needle pursuant to section thirty-three hundred eighty-one of the public health law.

Criminally possessing a hypodermic instrument is a class A misdemeanor.

§ 220.03 Criminal possession of a controlled substance in the seventh degree.

Effective October 28, 2010

A person is guilty of criminal possession of a controlled substance in the seventh degree when he or she knowingly and unlawfully possesses a controlled substance; provided, however, that it shall not be A violation of this section when a person possesses a residual amount of a controlled substance and that residual amount is in or on a hypodermic syringe or hypodermic needle obtained and possessed pursuant to section thirty-three hundred eighty-one of the public health law.

Criminal possession of a controlled substance in the seventh degree is a class A misdemeanor.
